

#### November 1: All Saints' Day

This day, formerly known in England as All Hallows and in France called "Toussaint," honours, all the saints, canonized and uncanonized, known and unknown. Long ago the church bells rang for most of the night before All Saints' Day to praise the saints "risen in their glory." Everywhere patronal and family saints are especially remembered. It is a feast to give them praise rather than to ask favours of them, a day for praising them to God rather than asking them to remember the living to Him.

In Hungry, on All Souls' Eve the graves are lit with candles and decorated with flowers.

In Czechoslovakia, the old tradition was to eat special cakes on All Souls' Eve, and drink cold milk "to cool the souls in Purgatory."

In **Belgium**, a particular variety of cake is baked, and it is an old superstition that "the more one eats of them the more souls will be saved from Purgatory. Traditionally, lights were set in windows to guide the departed back to their homes, and food was placed beside a candle or lighted lamp on the table to await them.

In **Brittany**, people, dressed in black and hurried home after vespers to talk together about the departed, speaking of them in low tones as if at a funeral. The best cloth was placed on the table with plates of bread and cheese and mugs of cider for the refreshment of the departed ones. As the living sit whispering together, they hear, or seem to hear, creaking floorboards from the ghosts who have come to rest that night in their former home. The saddest of all are the homeless dead who roam about the countryside but on this one night of the year they are permitted on earth. It is a Celtic custom to set food and drink on doorstep and window sill, so that homeless spirits too may have a share.

In many old English towns, maids went "souling" on All Souls' Eve, that is, singing for cakes, and one hears such ancient ballads as:

Soul! soul! for a soul-cake!

I pray, good misses a soul-cake--

An apple or pear, a plum or a cherry,

Any good thing to make us merry,

One for Peter, two for Paul,

Three for Him who made us all

#### **November 2: All Souls' Day**

After the feast in honour of the saints in heaven, comes the day of praying for the dead, particularly for members of the family, so "that they may quickly attain to the fellowship of the heavenly citizens."

FESTA DEI MORTI

In **Italy,** and especially in Sicily, good children who have prayed for the dead through the year are rewarded by having the "morti" leave gifts, and sometimes cakes.


Especially good are these "Fave dei Morti".



SICILIA

In **Poland** on All Souls' Day vespers are sometimes sung in the churchyards, and alms are given to the poor who in return are expected to offer prayers and petitions for the dead of the donor's family.

In **Spain**, every theatre gives a performance of the famous play "Don Juan Tenorio". The drama of the wicked lover who is dragged to hell by the ghost of the fair damsel to whom Don Juan proved unfaithful. The "Dia de Muertos" is an occasion so important in Mexico that its observance lasts for several days. Several days before, on October 30th, the souls of dead children are said to revisit their homes and spend the night. They are welcomed with flowers and food in gourds, as many gourds as there are "angelitos"--souls of dead children expected. And in the doorway of homes are placed chocolates and cakes and a candle lit for those children who have no one to remember them.
















NOVEMBER 11TH - REMEMBRANCE DAY

#### Memorial to a soldier (St Augustine's Chapel)

The special service marked the occasion of the unveiling of a memorial plaque to the veterans of the Second World War. The service was attended by civic dignitaries from Townsville and Thuringowa, representatives of the Defence Forces and returned service men's and women's organisations, all of whom had contributed to the cost of the plaque.





St Margaret of Scotland was also known as Margaret of Wessex. She was an English princess and a Scottish queen


## St Margaret's Magnetic Island

• In the 1950's Archdeacon Bill Hohenhouse was able to buy a barracks building from the Fort area of Florence Bay. This was erected at Endeavour Road, Arcadia, on land already owned by St. James Parish and it was to become the present St. Margaret's Church. It is conceivable that the land was given by the Hayles family in the 1920s when they subdivided the old Rheuben Estate which comprised practically the whole of Arcadia as we know it today. So the building was adapted as a church, furnished as a church and regular services were held at St. Margaret's, eclipsing the little church at Picnic Bay.

On his retirement from St. James Parish, Archdeacon Hohenhouse, who came to live on Magnetic Island, brought the daughter church of St. Margaret's under his guidance and care.


Until her recent retirement, the Rev Beryl Finch has kept St Margaret's in her faithful care for the last 29 years

#### FRANK CARROLL

Family attendance at worship was part of my childhood in the 1930's, and music was absolutely essential to me, so a commitment to church music naturally developed. We lived in a village sixty miles from Dubbo in New South Wales. Christian ministry was spread thinly in the area, and ecumenical co-operation made us familiar with Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian traditions.

In 1939 I went to Dubbo High and became a member of Holy Trinity Church Choir and emergency organist. Took geology at Sydney University and worked at the Bureau of Mineral Resources in Canberra. Returned to Dubbo in 1951 as music teacher, organist and choirmaster at Holy Trinity and studied organ-playing at Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

Between 1959 and 1966 I worked in England, including two years of study at the Royal School of Church Music.

I came to Townsville and St
James Cathedral in 1966. My
musical work has been sustained
by employment in the Town
Planning Department of the
Townsville City Council until my
retirement in 1991 after 21 years.
I have been greatly encouraged
by the splendid transformation of
the organ of St James' Cathedral.

## Christ the King

This symbol is the crown and the Chi-Rho which is the oldest known monografor Christ. Some call this symbol the "Christogram," and it dates back to the Roman Emperor Constantine (A.D. 306–337).

Chi (x = ch) and Rho (p = r) are the first three letters of "Christ" or "Christos" in the Greek language.

Alpha is the first letter of the Greek alphabet and Omega is the last. Together these two letters also form a monogram or symbol for Jesus Christ, meaning "the Beginning and the End." The term is found in Revelation 1:8: "I am the Alpha and the Omega," says the Lord God, "who is, and who was, and who is to come, the Almighty." (NIV)

#### Cathedral Livestock


When we made the move to Wills Street Ananias flatly refused to cross the main road. Perhaps he had noticed all the flattened remains of cats on it. So he lived alone in the Cathedral. It was plagued with bats nesting on the top of the brick work inside. They quite befouled the place. He would sit in the doorway in the half-light and catch lowflying ones. After all other efforts to eradicate them failed Billie Smith devised a scheme. He shut all the doors except the little porch where he kept a light on. He stood there with a tennis racket and exterminated them one by one as they flew through. Then there were pigeons nesting all over the roof, in spite of the attentions of small boys who used to climb up the unfinished ends of brick walls. Sometimes the pigeons got inside. Then they would go up into the roof till they starved so they were poor fare for Ananias. Then one Saturday night one perched on the highest pipe in the organ. Mrs. Cue was already on the organ stool on Sunday when Ananias leapt from the top of the swell and fell down with the pigeon inside the organ. As the service proceeded, from time to time his face would peer through the bottom of the pipes with a huge moustache of pigeon as he tried to find a way down. And at weddings the black cat that walked circles round the kneeling couple was worth an extra one pound on the fee.






They both thank God that He sent Ed back to Townsville to 2003!











### **UPDATED MYANMAR EMERGENCY APPEAL**

COVID-19 continues to wreak havoc in Myanmar. ABM's partner, the Church of the Province of Myanmar (CPM), has been responding in innovative and practical ways. The first \$10,000 sent by ABM was spent on oxygen cylinders and oxygen concentrators, as well as COVID-19 testing kits and cleaning materials. A second tranche of funds has just been sent.

This will be used to address the ongoing pandemic through: social media and a 24 hour hotline providing information about COVID-19 and how to treat it; telehealth consultations with church volunteer doctors and health professionals; and home care and other assistance by volunteers as directed by the doctors.

The CPM COVID Response Team hopes to reach over 5000 people.

LEIGHTON SMITH

AS Townsville's housing and homelessness crisis continues to worsen, helping hand by a local provider.

Centre, now the Althea Community Hub, has revealed it's helping dozens of people struggling with housing and finding their next meal.

Paula La Rosa said the city was continuing to do it tough.

"Unemployment rates (are) going up, housing prices are on the rise, we've seen a 40 per cent increase in rents, yet income has only gone up about half," Ms La Rosa stage and then just slept on

"The people that we work with are generationally living in poverty, but we're also seeing new faces access the centre to access supports after the loss of employment and through the domestic and family violence that's running rife through our community."

Chris Brown, 34, and Marie Pilcher, 45, know what it's like to struggle, with their move to Townsville eight months ago heralding the toughest time of their lives, sleeping rough in the city.

"We were always on and off the streets. We found it very hard to find our own place," Ms Pilcher said.

"We decided to go to the Reverend Charles Harris Diversionary Centre in Cosgrove and ever since then we just staved there."

The community hub and diversionary centre ran a combined program that provided the couple with short-term goals to help "get on track".

Recently, the hub's staff had a breakthrough by securing the couple a unit in Hermit Park - which they moved into on Monday.

"Now that we've got that stability, we really want to start working again," Ms Pilcher said.

The couple's success story is one of many that staff can share since Althea took over running the centre in 2017. Every day, the centre meets a range of needs for more than a 100 visitors.

Ms La Rosa said they were working with about 50 people a month on case plans, with the goal of accessing sustainable ac-




