

NEW GUINEA MARTYRS DAY

September 2nd

Who were the Martyrs of Papua New Guinea? Who are commemorated on September 2nd?

The Anglican Church in Australia has set this day aside to remember the twelve Anglicans who died in Papua New Guinea in 1942-3, during the Japanese invasion and occupation of the country we now know as Papua New Guinea.

They were:

John Barge, priest Margery Brenchley, nurse John Duffill, builder Leslie Gariardi, evangelist and teacher May Hayman, nurse Henry Holland, priest Lilla Lashmar, teacher Henry Matthews, priest Bernard Moore2, priest Mavis Parkinson, teacher Vivian Redlich, priest Lucian Tapiedi, evangelist and teacher

Were any of these people PNG Nationals? Yes, both Lucian Tapiedi and Leslie Gariardi.

What did they have in common?

Each of them died because, as an individual, they chose to continue to serve the people entrusted to them by God rather than travel to safety when they had the opportunity. It is this act of personal self denial in the face of imminent personal danger to their life that led inevitable to the death of each of them.

Why is it observed on September 2nd?

This has been chosen as one day to commemorate 12 people who died on various dates in 1942 and 1943. In a number of cases the actual dates of their deaths are unclear. The first synod of the Diocese of New Guinea after the war ended requested that such a date be set aside. At first they suggested September 1st since by that day in 1942 it was believed that all the martyrs from the Northern Province and Port Moresby were already dead. This was later amended to September 2nd and has been observed since 19473. In 1996 the date was agreed to be used as a commemorative date for all 333 Christian martyrs of the PNG in World War II.


Eliza Darling, NSW pioneer and social reformer (1798 - 1868)

Eliza Darling was the wife of one of the early governors (Sir Ralph Darling) of what was then the colony of New South Wales.

As Anita Selzer writes in *Governors' Wives in Colonial Australia*: "Traditionally, any analysis of Australian colonial society has focused on men in positions of power...Discussion of or reference to their wives (and private lives) has been largely omitted."

It would be doing many of these women a great injustice to simply leave them as footnotes to their husbands' lives and careers. This particularly true of Eliza, who was a woman way ahead of her time. She was a painter, designer and amateur architect, as well as a philanthropist and "pioneer social reformer"

September 11th Mother Esther CHN

founder of the Community of the Holy Name in Melbourne (1858 - 1931)

Melbourne was a big city with grand buildings, built with the discovery of gold, but behind the grand buildings was poverty, disease and death.

In 1884, some member of the Church of England formed "The Mission to the Streets and Lanes of Melbourne". Its was staffed by well-wishers who gave of their time generously, but as none had had any real experience of work, they were to find it very difficult to continue.

In 1888, they advertised for someone to come and work full-time for the Mission and it was suggested that Sister Esther may be able to help. So in that year she began her work for the Mission and then two women came to help her. The conditions at the Mission House left much to be desired. Sister Christina, one of the first Sisters, described the living conditions: "As a Probationer I was allowed to live at the rat-infested Mission House in a room with no door to it, only a curtain and a window looking out on a Chinaman's yard and a stable, and on the opposite side a house of ill fame, where they used to throw kerosene lamps at each other and squeal like sirens all night".






John Coleridge, first bishop of Melanesia, martyr (1827 - 1871)

He was an Anglican bishop, missionary to the South Sea Islands, and an accomplished linguist, learning 23 of the islands' more than 1,000 languages.

In 1861, Patteson was selected as the first Bishop of the <u>Anglican Church of Melanesia</u>. He was killed on <u>Nukapu</u>, one of the easternmost islands of the <u>Solomon Islands</u>.

Matthew Apostle, Evangelist and Martyr

According to Matthew 9:9 and Mark 2:14, Matthew was sitting by the customs house in <u>Capernaum</u> (near modern Almagor, <u>Israel</u>, on the <u>Sea of Galilee</u>) when Jesus called him into his company. Assuming that the identification of Matthew with Levi is correct, Matthew (probably meaning "Yahweh's Gift") would appear to be the <u>Christian name</u> of Levi (called by Mark "Levi the son of Alphaeus"), who had been employed as a tax collector in the service of <u>Herod Antipas</u>, tetrarch of <u>Galilee</u>. Because Levi's occupation was one that earned distrust and contempt everywhere, the scribes of the <u>Pharisees</u> criticized Jesus on seeing him eat with tax collectors and sinners, whereupon Jesus answered, "I came not to call the righteous, but sinners" (Mark 2:15–17).

According to Luke 5:29, the aforementioned dinner was given by Levi in his house after his call.



September 29th Michael & All Angels

St. Michael, who ranks among the seven archangels, is also one of the three angels mentioned by name in the Scriptures, the others being St. Raphael and St. Gabriel. St. Michael is spoken of twice in the Old Testament, and twice in the New. The first reference occurs in the Book of Daniel (chapter x), where Michael comes to comfort Daniel after he has had a vision and promises to be his helper in all things. In Daniel xii, Michael is called "the great prince who standeth for the children of Thy people." In these references Michael is represented as Israel's great support during the seventy years of the Babylonian captivity. Daniel, wise and holy leader that he was, wanted his people to understand that God had not forgotten them, and that, even though enslaved, they had a royal champion.

In the New Testament (Jude ix), we are told that Michael disputed with the devil over the body of Moses; this episode is not mentioned elsewhere in the Bible.

In the Apocalypse (chapter xii) we find the most dramatic reference to St. Michael. Here John recounts the great battle in Heaven, when the wicked angels under Lucifer revolt against God, and how Michael, leading the faithful angels, defeats the hosts of evil and drives them out. In this role he has been painted by many artists, and the poet Milton, in book vi of <Paradise Lost>, recounts the famous struggle. Because of this victory, St. Michael is revered in Catholic tradition and liturgy as the protector of the Church, as once he was regarded as the protector of the Israelites. In the Eastern Church, as well as among many theologians in the West, St Michael is placed over all the angels, as prince of the Seraphim.

He is the special patron of sick people, mariners, and grocers; in Asia Minor many curative springs were dedicated to him. His cult has also been popular in Egypt, Rome, France, and Germany. His emblems are a banner, a sword, a dragon, and scales. The name Michael is a variation of Micah, meaning in Hebrew, "Who is like God?"





William MacIntosh enlisted into the 31st Battalion (the Kennedy Regiment) in 1936 at Townsville and remained with the battalion until war was declared in 1939. In the November he joined the newly formed 2/9th Battalion at Redbank Camp in Brisbane and was promoted to Sergeant in the Vickers Medium Machine Gun Platoon. After spending some time training, he deployed to the United Kingdom and subsequently to North Africa.

In March 1941 the 2/9th Battalion led the 18th Brigade assault on the Italian fortress off Jaghbub (Giarabub). For his actions at Jaghbub between 19-21 March 1941 Sergeant William MacIntosh was awarded the Military Medal (MM) for outstanding courage, leadership and endurance. He then spent six months as part of the siege of Tobruk before returning to Australia in early 1942 in response to the Japanese threat.

In the August of 1942, Sergeant William MacIntosh was bound for New Guinea where the 2/9th Battalion were involved in operations in the vicinity of Cape Endaiadere and Sinemi Creek, (east of Buna) on the northern coast of New Guinea. This area was the scene of heavy fighting against the Japanese. In January 1943 he was wounded in action and for his fearless leadership and courage at Cape Endaiadere, then Lieutenant William MacIntosh was awarded the Military Cross (MC). He was also awarded a Mention In Despatches (MID) for his gallant and distinguished service in the South -West Pacific Area.

Lieutenant William MacIntosh returned to Australia in July 1944 and was promoted to Temporary Captain in the September. He served as part of the camp staff at Magnetic Island and ceased full time duty in February 1946.

William MacIntosh was born in Toowoomba but lived his childhood and adult life in Townsville. At the end of the war he remained in Townsville with his family and was a successful business man until retiring in Brisbane. Fellow machine gunners remember him as a fine soldier, an expert instructor and a "good mate" to be with.

MILITARY CROSS

Instituted in December 1914 by King George V and originally intended for lower ranking Army officers (Captain or less) and Warrant Officers for 'distinguished and meritorious services'. The award carries the post-nominal MC.

MILITARY MEDAL

Created in 1916 by King George V for other ranks in the Army to correspond with the Military Cross instituted two years earlier, but eventually back dated in availability to 1914. Awarded to other ranks for 'acts of gallantry and devotion to duty under fire'.

MENTION IN DESPATCHES

The Mention in Despatches (MID) is the oldest British award and was a device used by commanders at sea or in the field to bring the services of deserving officers to the attention of higher authority.

The MID was instituted in Australia in 1920 and took the form of a small oak leaf device.


Help us keep the doors open




